SUMMARY

New items in bold

Severe thunderstorms with winds surpassing 80 mph impacted the Commonwealth on the evening of Friday, 29 June, and continued into the early morning hours of Saturday, 30 June. Severe thunderstorms again impacted the Commonwealth on the evening of Saturday, 30 June and the afternoon of Sunday, 1 July.

EXECUTIVE ACTION

Governor Bob McDonnell declared a State of Emergency at 1100 hours on 30 June due to severe weather that impacted the Commonwealth on 29 June.

ESF #1 – Transportation

- Closed roads: **3** as of 1530 hours 10 July (-10 since Spot Report #11)
 - Secondary: **3** (-10)

ESF #2 – Communications

- Network engineers have validated network service restored for 264 of 265 sites across Virginia; remaining site being worked using normal Network Operation Center processes

ESF #3 – Public Works & Engineering

- **6** private waterworks on Boil Water Notice as of 1500 9 July
- Boil Water Notices expected to be lifted next 24 hours pending acceptable lab results

ESF #5 – Emergency Management

- VEOC transitioned to Recovery Operations, Tuesday, 10 July, with Normal staffing
- Virginia Emergency Response Team demobilized

ESF #12 – Energy: Power Outages as of 1530 hours:

Isolated severe thunderstorms during the afternoon and evening of 8 July and 9 July caused additional power outages across Virginia. Dominion Power had completed all power restoration from the 29 June storm. Power restoration expected to be completed 10 July.

ESF #14 – Long-Term Community Recovery and Mitigation

- Updated estimated total of \$25,810,818 in costs based on submitted Initial Damage Assessments
 - Electrical Cooperative costs estimated at \$11,819,947
 - Virginia Department of Transportation costs estimated at \$8,677,312
 - Localities costs estimated at \$5,314,459
- Four Joint Preliminary Damage Assessment (PDA) Teams to begin operations Wednesday, 11 July
 - Team A – Richmond and Lynchburg VDOT Districts and Southside and Mecklenburg Electric Cooperatives
 - Team B – Bristol and Salem VDOT Districts and Craig/Botetourt Electric Cooperative
 - Team C – Staunton VDOT District and BARC and Shenandoah Valley Electric Cooperatives
 - Team D – Culpeper, Fredericksburg and Northern Virginia VDOT Districts and Central Virginia, Rappahannock and Northern Virginia Electric Cooperatives
- Results of PDA's expected first part of next week

- Giant Food provided generator to assisted living facility in Fairfax County
- Operation Blessing provided refrigerator truck to Highland County
- Gleaning for the World donated truckloads of water
- God's Pit Crew donated truckloads of Gatorade
- Local volunteer groups continue assisting with debris clean up operations
- American Red Cross and Virginia Baptists provided meals in Bath County
- Mercy Chefs assisted feeding operations at City of Lynchburg shelter
- Southern Baptist Conservatives of Virginia Disaster Relief supported shelter operations in City of Lynchburg and provided chain saw crews
- North American Mission Board provided 2,500 cases of water to City of Roanoke
- Anticipate inquires about assistance through Virginia Disaster Relief Fund
